I felt forced to work from home before Covid and asked what rent the university would pay for my son's bedroom, now a study. In fact, I do most of my work in the dining room - we do not have people for dinner currently, and there is a big table to spread papers on, rather than a small crowded desk. My wife is very tolerant.

'normal' (saving traveling time), brainstorm greater ideas, and consequently feel meaningful to the world.
