00:49:33 Vincenzo Raimo: Historically, more than 50% of all new Chinese student entrants to UG study to UK HEIs were admitted with advanced standing ie directly to yr 2 or 3 and therefore are likely to have come through articulation agreements through joint programmes, joint colleges and joint universities. Through the Covid period UK and Chinese universities showed that they could continue to collaborate and support students to completion without the previously required mobility. (i) Now that regulations in China require joint programmes to give students the opportunity to complete the foreign degree in China without the need for travel will fewer Chinese students chose to complete their UK degree fully in China without traveling for a year or more to the UK? and (ii) will joint programmes & joint colleges with Chinese partners become less attractive to UK universities motivated by the financial benefits gained primarily through students transferring to the UK?

Also, very interested that affordability is the top factor for both students and parents in your research for international mobility. So maybe joint programmes which reduce the overall cost of study abroad because the study period abroad is reduced will become more attractive and more students will use these routes to overseas study?
