## A less attractive UK higher education to EU students? An unprecedented challenge yet a predictable Brexit fallout, 7 October 2021



00:39:37 Nicholas Hillman: Some of the comments from your participants about the financial impact on institutions seem rather naive, given that UK universities often make a loss on students on the 'home' funding system and when those EU international students who do still come will pay very much higher fees.

00:46:39 Fieldon King Alexander: From 1992 to 2005 access expanded dramatically when the Poly's became universities in England. However, the only new funding to universities to support this expanded access was not government funding but was on the backs of incoming international students. It seems to me from my experiences, that this decline in applications will result in a 20% to 30% loss in student fee revenues which is a major fiscal problem for UK institutions, particularly England.
